


A better future for street connected children and vulnerable youth in Ghana





































About Adamfo Ghana

Adamfo Ghana is a Dutch charity that is passionate about creating a better future for street connected children and vulnerable youth in Ghana. We partner with different local NGOs and CBOs like Safe-Child Advocay in Kumasi; Centre for Development and Policy Advocacy (CEDEPA); Song-Ba Empowerment Centre; Yaakoro Youth Development Centre in Tamale; and Urban Poor Child Organisation (UPCO) in Accra.



Projects

Our Study Fund provides scholarships to enable 50 children in Ghana to continue their education up to Senior High School. The children are supported for three years, until they graduate and obtain a diploma.

Three Vocational Training Centers in Kumasi and Tamale provide girls from the streets with a safe place to stay, food, care and skills training in the vocation of their choice. After two years of training the girls complete with the nationally recognised NVTI exams. These young entrepreneurs receive a set-up pack so they can immediately start their own business.

To children living on the streets, we provide family-based support. This way children can leave the streets, grow up in a safe family environment and go to school.

With awareness raising, lobby and advocacy we create more understanding and commitment to the cause among local communities, leaders and policy makers. We give street connected children a voice and empower them to stand up for their rights.

Our impact

- every year 50 children go to (senior) high school
- 150+ girls have been able to leave the streats, are home and in vocational training
- 3 day care centers provide a safe place for 250+ babies and toddlers of street connected mothers
- already **55** young ladies started their own business after completing skills training and receiving set-up packs
- already **62 pupils** obtained their senior high school certificate

- 3 vocational training centers are training 50+ girls yearly in vocations like hair dresser, dressmaker. catering or technician
- 500+ teenage girls received washable sanitary pads, so they are able to continue school during their period
- 15 local and national television & radio stations raised awareness on the issue of youth streetism
- 100+ politicians, policy makers and representatives discussed the issue of **Youth** streetism







Street connected children in Ghana

In Ghana, more ten thousands of children live or work on the streets. They do not go to school for many different reasons, like inability to pay school fees or the need for additional income for the family. Children also leave their homes because of unsafe circumstances, broken families and sometimes because of a sick or deceased parent. vulnerable children face risks of (sexual) exploitation and
